A Tribute to CARES Volunteers

“Morty”

Six years ago, my new husband and I experienced a very sad Christmas when we lost both of our beloved cats within a week of each other. Kyla and Minew were step-kitties. We had each brought a cat into our newly blended family. Kyla, my shaded silver Persian princess, was 14 at the time and not impressed with the likes of the lunky, 6 year old orange tabby, Minew. He had a nasty habit of lying in wait for her and, as she pranced by him, he liked to leap up and smack her on the head – just for the heck of it.

While deeply grieving their loss, we vowed to each other, no more kitties for a while. Well, as many of you who have experienced the loss of a beloved pet know, after a couple of months, a house can become very, very quiet. So, with our grief easing up a bit,

we decided it was time to adopt another baby.

I can't remember how we ended up at Petsmart but I'm sure glad we did. There, inside one of the steel cages, was another big orange boy, who seemed to be patiently waiting for us to come and get him. We debated for a while because of his resemblance to Minew and wondered if this was too painful. But when I opened Morty's cage to pet him and he leaned over and lightly, licked me on the forehead, there was no more debate. He was our new boy.

Morty has a wise stillness about him, almost a resignation to his fate. We don't know anything about his past, except that C.A.R.E.S. figured he was about 2 years old and he had been living at the shelter for about 5 months. There is a legend that many little kittens were thrown into a river to drown. The mother cat wept and was so distraught that the willows on the bank felt compassion and held out their branches to the struggling kittens. The little kittens clung to them and were saved. Ever since that time, each Spring, the willow wears grey buds that feel as soft and silky as the coats of little kittens. Thus, these trees were called 'pussy willows'.

RINGWORM

Ringworm is caused by a fungus that grows on the hairs, not by a worm. Ringworm is common in many species and can be transferred from one species to another, including man. The ringworm most commonly found is called *Microsporum canis*, and usually causes white, scaly, bald patches, especially around the head region. Certain cats may even be carriers of ringworm without having the infection themselves. It is, therefore, very difficult for a veterinarian to examine a cat and say it is definitely free of ringworm. Cat ringworm can usually be seen to glow green under a special

ultraviolet light known as a Wood's Lamp. It may also be visible on the hairs under a microscope.

The disease is not uncommon and the spores of the fungus are resistant to disinfectants. They can stay in the environment for a long time remaining infectious; therefore, ridding the area of the fungus can be difficult. Certain medical preparations can be used for localized problems, but affected cats usually have to be treated with tablets of an antifungal drug called griseofulvin. This drug protects the cat by being incorporated into new hairs as they grow, so initial clipping of the hair followed by up to three months of treatment may be necessary.

UPPER RESPIRATORY DISEASE

Feline "Cat Flu" is a disease that can be caused by several different agents, but about 80% of cases are caused by one of the two feline respiratory viruses - feline herpesvirus (FVR) and feline calicivirus (FCI). Cats cannot catch influenza or cold viruses from humans. These two types of virus are much less resistant than the feline distemper virus, and, while they can be spread indirectly, they are usually spread by direct cat to cat contact or by aerosol inhalation due to sneezing. Each of the two types of virus tend to produce somewhat different symptoms which can develop as early as 24 hours after infection. FVR causes the most severe form of feline respiratory disease, with runny eyes and nose and sneezing, making the cat feel very unwell. Some cats die due to dehydration or a secondary pneumonia. FCI may also cause runny eyes and nose, but typically results in the development of painful ulcers on the tongue, and sometimes on the mouth and nose.

At present, there are no drugs that are effective in killing off the viruses once the cat has caught them

and treatment relies on antibiotics to prevent secondary infection, multivitamins to try to improve the cat's resistance and careful nursing to keep the cat's strength up while it is trying to fight off the virus. Both viruses may linger in the nerve cells for many years, multiplying and causing bouts of illness when the cat is stressed and its defenses are lowered. The damage caused by the viruses may also leave the cat with long-term conjunctivitis or runny nose (known descriptively as "chronic snuffles"). Vaccines are also available against these two major causes of feline respiratory disease and are widely used to prevent the disease. It is too late to consider vaccination once your cat has contracted the disease. All kittens should be vaccinated at 8 weeks, given a booster shot at 12 weeks and given annual booster injections. Eliminating the virus from the environment is not much of a problem since the viruses are susceptible to most common disinfectants or even to a dose of sunlight, but in multi-cat households, it may be virtually impossible to identify and eliminate the cats that are carrying the viruses.
